Supervisor stated that he had called this meeting to report to the Board that insufficient funds were available for the payment of the principal and interest of certain town Bonds that were due and payable on the 1st day of July, 1933 and asked the pleasure of the Board on this matter.

Mr. Sturm offered the following resolution and moved its adoption:

WHEREAS, C. CHASE ZALEMSKI, A Supervisor of the Town of Cheektowaga, has reported to this Town Board that insufficient funds were available for the payment of the principal and interest of certain town bonds heretofore issued by the Town of Cheektowaga and which became due and payable on the first day of July, 1933, in the principal sum of Two Hundred twenty-three thousand four hundred and twenty dollars and Fifty-eight cents (\$223,420.58) together with interest charges in the further sum of Forty-eight thousand ninety-one Dollars and Eighty-three cents (\$48,091.83), and

WHEREAS, on the 14th day of November, 1932, the Town Board of this Town, pursuant to the provisions of Article VI A of the Town Law, duly adopted its annual estimates and tax budget for the year of 1933, and included therein an appropriation for the payment of the principal and interest of the bonds hereinbefore referred to sufficient for the payment thereof, and

WHEREAS, the total appropriation in such annual estimates and tax budget for the various Town purposes, after the deduction of anticipated revenue, amounts to \$680,226.71 and

WHEREAS, the Board of Supervisors of the County of Erie, on the 15th day of November, 1932, duly levied, assessed and provided for the raising by tax upon the real and personal property liable to taxation in the Town of Cheektowaga, the said amount hereinbefore referred to, and

WHEREAS, the warrant heretofore delivered to the Receiver of the Taxes and Assessments of this Town by the County of Erie directed said Receiver of Taxes and Assessments to collect for the year 1933 the total sum of Nine Hundred and Seventy-five thousand seventy-four Dollars and thirty-six cents (\$975,074.36) for all purposes, and

WHEREAS, said Receiver of Taxes and Assessments collected of such total sum the amount of Three hundred and fourteen thousand four hundred and twenty-nine dollars and twenty cents (\$314,429.20) and has heretofore on the first day of July, 1933, returned said tax roll to the Treasurer of the County of Erie, pursuant to law, and

WHEREAS, the Treasurer of the County of Erie pursuant to law has collected as of July 1st, 1933 the additional amount of one hundred thirty-nine thousand six hundred and fifty three dollars and twenty-five cents (\$139,653.25), of which amount said County Treasurer has paid to the Supervisor of this Town the sum of Fifty-four thousand four hundred and forty-one dollars and fifteen cents (\$54,441.15,) and

WHEREAS, the total appropriation in the annual estimate and tax budget of the year 1933 for various Town purposes, after the deduction of anticipated revenue, amounts to six hundred and eighty thousand two hundred and twenty-six dollars and seventyone cents (\$680,226.71), of which amount the Supervisor of this Town has received from the Receiver of Taxes and Assessments of this Town and the Treasurer of the County of Erie, the total sum of Three hundred and sixty-eight thousand eight hundred and seventydollars and thirty-five cents (\$368,870.35) only, and

WHEREAS, there is owing to the Town of Cheektowaga and payable by the County of Erie, pursuant to law, the further sum of Three Hundred and eleven thousand three hundred fifty-six dollars and thirty-six cents (\$311,356.36)

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Town of Cheektowaga, borrow from the Manufacturers & Traders Trust Company of Buffalo, New York for the purposes aforesaid the sum of Two Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$200,000.00) in anticipation of the receipt of taxes and revenues for the fiscal year beginning January 1st, 1933 and ending December 31st, 1933, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that one Certificate of Indebtedness of the Town of Cheektowaga in the County of Erie and State of New York, in the principal sum of Two Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$200,000.00), dated the 7th day of July, 1933, bearing interest at the rate of six per centum per annum and payable ninety (90) days from date, be issued in anticipation of the receipt of taxes and revenues for the fiscal year beginning January 1st, 1933 and ending December 31st, 1933 and that such Certificate of Indebtedness be issued in substantially the following form:

THE TOWN OF CHEEKTOWAGA, a municipal corporation in the County of Erie, State of New York, hereby acknowledges its indebtedness and for value received promises to pay to the Manufacturers & Traders Trust Company of Buffalo, New York or order ninety days from the date hereof the sum of Two Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$200,000.00), together with interest thereon from the date hereof at the rate of six per centum (6%) per annum. The Town of Cheektowaga reserves the right to call this note for payment at any time prior to its due date. Both principal and interest hereof are payable in lawful money of the United States of America at the Manufacturers & Traders Trust Company of Buffalo, New York.

This Certificate of Indebtedness is issued by the Town Board of the Town of Cheektowaga, County of Erie, and State of New York, pursuant to Section 149 of the Town Law as amended, against revenues and taxes levied for the fiscal year beginning on the 1st day of January, 1933 and ending on the 31st day of December, 1933 and pursuant to a resolution duly adopted by the Town Board of the said Town on the 1st day of July, 1933.

It is hereby certified, recited and declared that all acts, conditions and things required to exist, to happen and to be performed precedent to and in the issuance of this Certificate of Indebtedness, exist, have happened and have been performed in due time, form and manner as required by law, and that the issue of the Certificate of Indebtedness of which this is one, together with all other indebtedness of said Town, is within every debt and other limit prescribed by the Constitution and laws of the State of New York. The full faith and credit of said Town are hereby irrevocably pledged to the punctual payment of the principal and interest hereof,

A quorum being present to transact any and all business that may come before the board the chairman called the meeting to order.

A tentative announcement from the Department of Civil Service relative to examination for patrolman, and police departments of Erie County to be held in the near future in the Town of Amherst, Cheektowaga, Lancaster and West Seneca was presented and read.

On motion of Milne, seconded by Faber this tentative examination was approved of and the Town Clerk was authorized to notify the Department of Civil Service of this action.

Communication from Union Free School Dist. No. 11 petitioning the Town Board for an over head traffic signal at the intersection of Delavan Ave. and Andrew Street was referred to the Chief of Police and Highway Supt. Eberl.

On motion of Sturm, seconded by Faber, Case No. 6765 from the Department of Public Service was ordered received and filed.

Communication from the State department of Health, relative to aid to the various Towns through the National Industrial Recovery Act, passed by Congress such as improvements to Disposal plants, water districts, and Garbage incinerators, was referred to the Finance Committee by Supervisor Zalemski.

On motion of Eberl, seconded by Faber the report from Engineer Frederick K. Wing on his investigation of Sewers in district No. 5 and disposal plant No. 5 was ordered received and filed for further consideration.

Gentlemen:-

Supplementing our reports of April 28th, and May 31, 1933,- we beg to report progress as follows:

We have now measured up 15.7 miles of the lateral sanitary sewers that were built for the Town by various contractors. There are about 10 miles more of these laterals.



The Town Clerk is going through the minutes of the meetings of the Town Board for 1927, 1928, 1929, 1930 and 1931,- to find the awarding of these contracts and the prices fixed thereby.

We are enclosing blue prints showing the condition of the manholes and the surface of the sewer trenches in the Kenda Construction Co., Inc.'s sewer job.

In relation to the Sewage Disposal Plant we have the following comments to make. The plans turned over to me by the Town Board consist of eight (8) sheets of blue prints, numbered 38, 39, 40, 41, 42, 43, 44 and 45A. Sheets 38 and 39 are entitled "Pump House". The title on sheet 38 has printed above it

"Consulting Sanitary Engineer"  
"H. Burdetee Cleveland,"  
"New York City."

To my mind this would indicate that Mr. Cleveland was the consulting engineer who designed the plant for George C. Diehl, C.E. Inc., as his (Cleveland's) name appears on all the sheets except sheet 39. All the sheets are dated May, 1927 except sheet 43 which bears the date April, 1927,- sheets 38 and 39 refer to the Pump House. Sheets 40, 41, and 42 refer to the Imhoff Tank and sheet 42 also refers to the Sludge Bed. Sheet 43 refers to Sprinkling Filter; sheet 44 to Chlorination building; sheet 45 to the Layout of plant and section through plant.

The sewage from the sewers reaches the disposal plant at the pump station. This station is provided with two pumps, each having a capacity of 2,000 gallons per minute. I am advised that when both pumps operate, the 4,000 gallons a minute of sewage that is forced to the Imhoff tanks, floods over the walls and onto the adjacent ground. Either there should have been greater free board (that is, higher walls) on the Imhoff tanks,- the pumping capacity should not have been so great,- or the capacity of the apparatus at the dosing tanks and sprinkling filters should have been greater.

In the design of the dosing tank, feeds and siphons in connection with the sprinkling filters, the siphons are of the "Twin Siphons" type, so interconnected that only one feed to one dosing tank is intended to operate at a time. This permits one tank to fill up as the other is discharging. But the capacity of this layout is only a little over 1100 gallons per minute as a maximum, and 850 gallons per minute as an average,- so that when the 2000 gallons a minute pump is operating there is bound to be trouble.

The disposal plant was designed for 12,000 population. Evidently 100 gallons per person per day was used as the average flow to reach the plant, which would make 1,200,000 gallons per day or an average flow of 833 gallons per minute for the 1440 minutes in a day. The maximum flow was evidently computed by adding 1/3 extra for infiltration in the sewers, which would make 1,111 gallons per minute. But the designer of the plant evidently did not figure on sewers that leaked as badly as those in sewer district No5, Cheektowaga. There is no leeway in the dosing apparatus at the sprinkling filters, as it is designed for a maximum flow of 1,111 gallons per minute and can't take much overload and still function properly. In this respect the Kenda Co. (the contractor) is not all to blame, but the engineer is,- for if he designs a disposal plant with a maximum capacity of 1,111 gallons per minute, he should design and supervise the construction of his sewer system so that while the tributary population remains below 12,000 persons (and it still is), there will only come to the sewage disposal plant not to exceed 1,111 gallons per minute. The fact that both pumps have been used at times indicates that at least 4,000 gallons a minute have come to the plant and been pumped. But that is not all the flow that would have come through the sewers,- for the sludge and other things that have coated the rungs of the manhole #57 in Kilbourne Drive at Central Boulevard) (adjacent to the Plant) show plainly that the sewage has backed up in this and other sewers, so far that it has risen in this manhole its full dept of 21.2 feet.

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This plainly indicated that the amount pumped (4,000 gallons per minute) was but a fraction of what the sewers would have brought to the plant had it been able to take it. Backing up of sewage in the sewers causes flooding of cellars, - with its consequent unsanitary results and annoyances.

The flow coming to the disposal plant at present time is about 560,000 to 590,000 gallons per day or at an average rate of about 400 gallons per minute. This is only a fifth of the rate of each of the pumps, - which means that the pump will run for about 8 minutes and overload the disposal plant and then for about 37 minutes the pump will be idle and the flow through the plant stopped, - which is wrong for the proper operation of a disposal plant. What should have been planned was to have one pump at least that would approximate the ordinary flow that was expected and then have some pumps that could act as spares and take additional loads.

At the Imhoff tanks, the method and means of drawing sludge is bad. In drawing sludge it is first led into an open horizontal trough on the side of the tank. It then has to be pushed through this trough to the pipe leading downward and onto the sludge bed. The sludge should have been drawn directly from the bottom of the tank through a closed pipe to the sludge drying bed. It would then not have been necessary to have the costly troughs on the sides of the tanks, - thereby also preventing the using of the side wall of one tank for the adjoining tank when the plant is enlarged.

The sludge bed, too, is an extravagant affair, - having two 4 foot concrete walks its entire length of 192 feet. As the glass house over the bed is 39.2 feet wide inside, - over one-fifth of it is taken up by walks. Glass covers cost money and the bed need only have been 153 feet long, and plant runways would have been sufficient on which to wheel out the dried sludge; or a narrow gauge track and car or overhead carriers, would have saved money.

Another extravagance is the four lines of 8" cast iron sludge pipes, about 800 feet in all, to conduct the sludge the length of the bed, - and the 44 eight inch gate valves, of which only 4 are needed (and only 4 are used.) For in the drawing of the sludge onto the bed only the four valves near the high end are opened, and as the bed is on a 1% slope, the sludge flows down its whole length. This extravagance shows an apparent lack of experience on the part of the engineer with the actual performance of sludge.

Another feature of the plant that warrants criticism is the failure to have earth fill around the Imhoff tank to keep the temperature of the sewage up in the winter time and down in the summer. Failure also to have the piping adjacent to the dosing tanks and filter beds covered, has already caused the freezing and breaking of the pipes. In the easterly filter bed there must be bad leaks in the piping leading to the riser pipes with the spray nozzles on top, - for even before the nozzles begin to spray, large volumes of water come out through the openings in the wall of the filter at four different places and the easterly dosing tank never fills to the top. I have marked these places and have asked Mr. John Eberl to dig up the pipes and try and find the leaks.

Paragraph 14 of the specifications reads as follows: "The Contractor shall complete the work or improvement in a satisfactory and durable manner so as not to require repairs within one year from the date of completion of the contract; the Contractor shall during the said year make all repairs or replacements as may be necessary on account of improper or unskillful workmanship or the use of defective or imperfect material, and the contract bond shall remain in effect until the expiration of this one year period."

Paragraph 34 of the specifications reads as follows: "The contractor shall be further required to maintain the trenches for a period of one year after the completion and formal acceptance of the work and shall fill with suitable material all settlements that take place in the trenches during this time so that the surface of the ground shall be left in as good condition as when the work was commenced. If such settlements occur and the Contractor does not begin to fill the same within ten days after date of mailing a notice to do his work to the Contractor by the Engineer, then the Board may order such work done and charge the expense thereof to the Contractor and deduct the same from any moneys retained by it."

The last payment to the Kenda Co. was not made until Aug. 20, 1930, while the final estimate (No. 10) was made and \$97,000 of it paid Nov. 8th, 1928.. This means that after the final estimate, which was made on Nov. 5, 1928, the contractor was obligated to keep the work in repair and remedy any defects until Nov. 5, 1929. The sewers needed repair and defects needed remedying in that years time. Ordinarily the back fill in sewer trenches is more loose and porous during the first year than at any later time, and if the engineer had examined the trenches, evidence of the leakages that existed this spring must have been visible during that year. The engineer should have made an examination of all the work before the year of free maintenance by the contractor was up and should have required the Contractor to repair all defects. On account of the contractor not having been required to do this work, the taxpayers are having to spend their money to have it done now.

I am enclosing a copy of letter sent to George C. Diehl, C.E. Inc. which is self-explanatory.

WHEREAS, the Keneflick Commission has requested the Towns so affected to submit a plan for the correction of such situation and to recommend a more efficient system for the collection of taxes and assessments for the future, and

WHEREAS, it is imperative that immediate action be taken to comply with the request of the Keneflick Commission, and

WHEREAS, the preparation of any such plan will require considerable research and investigation,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that Carlton A. Fisher, Town Attorney be and hereby is authorized and directed to prepare such a report and to submit such a plan and to employ such assistance as he may determine necessary and that the expense thereof, be charged against the Contingent Fund and not to exceed \$1200.00.

The following communication was presented and read.

TO The Honorable Town Board;

The following resolution was duly adopted at our last regular meeting.

WHEREAS, This Committee has carefully considered the advisability of establishing the Ward System in the Town of Cheektowaga and has weighed the advantages and disadvantages of electing councilmen by wards or at large.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that this Committee go on record in favor of electing councilmen at large instead of by wards for the reason that this Committee believes that by electing councilmen at large they will naturally have the welfare of the entire Township in their mind when exercising their powers as councilmen, while, if elected from wards, there would be a great tendency for each councilman to secure additional favors for this own ward and in so doing and in obtaining he would naturally be under obligation to them to support possibly some unworthy project for their ward. This would result in a great increase in taxes and would not be for the betterment of the Town as a whole.

Town Attorney Fisher, questioned Lieutenant Zalemski and Patrolman Walter Przepiora relative to the charges placed against them, (this testimony being on file in the Town Clerk's office).

Supervisor Zalemski then asked the Board's pleasure on the reinstatement of these two officers.

Gentlemen:

The last paragraph in my third progress report under date of June 30th, 1933 referred to a communication from me to George C. Diehl, C. E., Inc. dated June 30th, 1933 and a copy of which I enclosed. In this communication, I asked for information as follows:

1st, Copy of Estimate # 1 of the Kenda Co. contract.

2nd. Location of special manhole 38 to 40 feet deep, for which the Diehl Co. included the contract price of \$4,600 in their Estimate No. 10 of the Kenda Co. contract.

3rd, Copies of all the written orders for extra work, as required by the specifications.

4th. Copies of "changes in the grades or plans of the work" which had been approved by the Town Board.

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On July 1st, 1933 a reply was received from George C. Diehl, Inc. and signed by Newell L. Nussbaumer, as Vice President. We give a copy of the letter in full below.

Dear Sir:

We have your letter in regard to certain matters in connection with your investigation of the sewer system in District No. 5, Town of Cheektowaga.

Your first question is in regard to Estimate No. 1. We can not supply you with this estimate. Our file of papers and data in regard to this job from the time when the construction was actually started was kept in our Lancaster office where Mr. Leupold represented Mr. Diehl. About two years ago that office was closed and the records of all jobs as far as we know were brought from that office to our present office at 22 South Division St., Buffalo. In going through the material which Mr. Leupold turned over to us I find nothing on sewer District No. 5.

The second question is in regard to the special manhole 38-40 feet deep for which the contract price of \$4600 was included in the payment recommended in estimate No. 10. I am sending to you prints of our drawing No. 8, which shows the original layout at this point on Delavan Avenue just west of Pine Ridge Road and shows the detail of the manhole, and sheet No. 36 which shows the original design of the booster pumping station. After construction was begun and the character of the soil at this location determined it was decided that a better structure and improved operation could be obtained by building according to revised plan No. 36 which I am sending you. After checking the quantities, labor and equipment, we considered that the cost of the revised booster station should be considered equal to the old booster station plus the special manhole and recommended to the Board that payment be made on that basis. The board approved our recommendation.

The third question is in regard to extra work orders called for in paragraph 23 of the specifications. These work orders would have been in the file department of the Lancaster Office and since we have none of that material we are unable to supply you with copies of these orders.

Question Number four is in regard to changes in the grades or plans of work which were made with the approval of the Town Board. There were a number of minor changes made from time to time. The only major change was in the chlorinating and dosing equipment for the treatment plant. We are sending you a copy of sheet No. 44 which shows the original layout and type of treatment plant. This layout showed pre-chlorination ahead of the sprinkling filters. Later dealings with the Pacific Flush-tank Company developed some difficulties and our plans were revised according to the sheet marked Dosing chamber and Chlorinating Plant, and approved by the State Department of Health, November 9, 1927, which showed chlorination after the sewage passed through the sprinkling filters. We studied both types of construction and found that the revised plan was the more desirable. Our recommendation to the Town Board was that the new construction be approved at no increase in price to the Town. Payment was made on this basis.



If there are certain definite items about which you desire information and you could inform us to these, we would be very glad to make further investigation to explain what took place at the time to account for variation that you have found. Since our file is so incomplete it is very difficult for us to point out these differences if such exist unless we go to the same trouble and expense to find them that you have in your investigation. We wish to be of assistance to you and to the Town Board in all matters and hope that you will call on us at any time.

This letter brings the reply to my first question that they have nothing in the way of papers or date on Sewer District No. 5. This is certainly a loose way to handle the business of a client that amounted to over a million dollars in less than a year, and for which George C. Diehl C. E. Inc. received over \$53,000, -for "surveying, staking out and supervision of construction."

The answer to my second question about the location of the special manhole, is equally surprising. This special manhole was 38 to 40 feet deep and the bid price was \$4,600. Their (final) "Estimate No. 10" reads as follows, in regard to it, -

"Item No. 13. Booster Station & Manhole, 100% Complete, - \$23,015.00"

This statement would certainly lead one to believe that the manhole was built, as the bid price for the booster station was \$18,415, and this added to the \$4,600 for the special manhole, makes the \$23,015, the exact amount estimated and allowed under Item No. 13. Their surprising answer is to the effect that the special manhole was not built at all.

This major change in plan of the Booster Station should have received an approval by the Board, in accordance with Article 32 of the Specifications. Although the letter states that the Board did approve, the present Town Clerk has made an examination of the records and finds no such approval.

The revised booster station called for more concrete, piping, guide bearings, shafting, beams, a spiral stairway and a basket screen. We have taken off these additional quantities from the plans and made an estimate of their cost. The cost of the concrete is based on the price bid in the Kenda Co. proposal, and must be followed. The cost of all other items is based upon prices given by parties who furnish those materials.

The Engineers allowed \$4,600 extra, or about \$3,243.50 too much. This injustice as to cost, to the taxpayers, is actually authorized by Article 23 of the Specifications, being another example of the Engineer's authority to "fix by Agreement" the price for extra work not included in the bid.

Their answer to my third question is similar to their answer to my first one, viz: they have not the papers. If Mr. Leupold has them, - why does not George C. Diehl, C.E., Inc. get them and turn them over to the Town authorities?

Their answer to my fourth question in regard to changes in the grades or plans of work which had been approved by the Town Board, - brings out the revised plan for the "Dosing Chamber and Chlorinating Plant", which comes to our attention for the first time. The Town turned over to us all the plans they possessed of the Disposal Plant, but this revised plan was not among them.

However the dosing chamber and chlorinating plant were built according to the revised plan and the contractor was paid according to his original bid although there is a marked decrease in the quantity of materials and labor, for instance, the brick chlorinating house is only 12'-8" by 18'-8", whereas the original plan called for a brick building 19 ft. by 49 ft. or four times as large. The cubical contents of the present building is about 2585 cu. ft. and of the original one about 10,050 cu. ft., or a difference of 7465 cu. ft. Applying 15 cts. per cubic foot to this reduction in the contents of the building, would make the saving in cost about \$1,119.00. And the concrete walls on which the present building is constructed and which constitute the exterior chlorination tank walls, contain only about 51 cu. yds. of concrete, while those of the original one would have contained about 146 cu. yds. This difference of 95 cu. yds. at \$30 per cubic yard (the price bid) would amount to an additional saving of \$2,850. Then the siphons were reduced from 18" as shown on the original plan, to 14", - this made a saving of at least \$2000. These three items alone total \$5,969, - a saving to the contractor. But as in former cases the taxpayer was forgotten as no reduction was made in the contract price. This is another example of the Engineer's authority to fix by agreement, the price for extra work not included in the bid.

There is also a peculiarity I wish to bring to your attention, viz: that this so called revised plan does not state that it is such, - does not bear the name of its designer (Except that the word, Brennan, is printed in very small letters in one corner, probably the name of the draughtsman) and does not state the location of the plant of which it is a part. If the State Department's approval stamp did not state that it referred to District 5, Cheektowaga, no one would know what it was all about.

Referring to the Sewage Disposal Plant, - it certainly was an extravagance to buy 11- $\frac{1}{2}$  acres of land for the site of the plant, as that is sufficient for a city of 100,000 population. It certainly was an extravagance to fence it all in with 2848 ft. of high priced fencing. It certainly was an extravagance to lay out the disposal plant with the pump station 80 feet back from the street line and a space of 374 feet between the pump station and the Imhoff tank, and a space of over 340 feet between the Imhoff tank and the dosing tank for the sprinkling filters. This layout resulted in the final effluent line beginning at a point 637 feet south of Central Boulevard, when this could have begun at a point only 150 feet south of that street an extravagance of 487 extra feet of effluent line.

An economical layout would have been to place the sludge bed near the west line with a roadway between it and the fence; next to the east would have come the Imhoff tanks with the sludge lines leading directly to the sludge bed and the effluent line leading directly to the dosing tanks and sprinkling filters, which would be placed directly east of the Imhoff tank. This would have made the plant more compact and would have saved many thousands of dollars in its cost.

In connection with the plan of the Imhoff tanks we find that the sewage, as it flows into the tanks passes through a 16" cast iron main distributor pipe, the length of the tanks. It is then diverted to two 12" cast iron lateral distributor pipes (At each end of the tanks) and is discharged into the tanks through four inclined 10" gate valves. Then one of the 2000 gallons per minute pumps is operating, the velocity of flow through these 10" valves is 122 feet per minute. The velocity of flow of the liquid in the upper story or sedimentation part of the Imhoff tank, should not exceed one foot per minute, - because sedimentation is accomplished only by retarding the velocity of flow of the liquid and 1/2 foot to 1 foot per minute has been found to give the best results.

This sewage being discharged into a tank through four openings in the width of 24 feet at the rate of 122 feet per minute, creates an undesirable condition which could have been avoided by having the sewage pass over a weir the full width of the tank, - thereby causing the least disturbance possible. Besides, - the eight 10" valves are absolutely unnecessary, and therefore an extravagance, - as there are 12" valves where the four lateral distributors leave the main distributor, which control the situation completely. Then again, when the sewage leaves the Imhoff tanks it is required to pass through six 10" shear gates. During the pumping of 2000 gallons a minute the level of the sewage in the Imhoff tanks necessarily rises about half the diameter of these six gates or about 5 inches, and when pumping stops, the level of the sewage drops again to the bottom of them, - a condition to be avoided. The velocity of the liquid as it enters the shear gates is about 160 feet per minute. Here again a weir, the full width of the tanks over which discharge the liquid, would improve conditions very much. When both of the 2000 gallons per minute pumps are operating, these velocities through the valves is double those mentioned above and still further aggravates a bad condition. And when both pumps are operating, the raising of the sewage to the level of the main distributor, which is 3 feet higher than the flow level in the Imhoff tanks, increases the power required by 3 horse power for each motor, - adding a permanent increase to the cost of operation.

Since our last report we have finished the measurements and examination of the sewers and manholes of the various lateral sewers in the district. There are more than twenty-five miles of these sewers, more by five miles, than there were in the original Kenda Co. contract. We will tell of the condition of these sewers as well as their financial aspect in our next report.



#### Fifth Progress Report.

To the Honorable  
Town Board  
Cheektowaga, N.Y.

Gentlemen:

Since my fourth progress report, dated August 1, 1933, - we have been compiling data in regard to the twenty-five miles and more of the lateral sewers. Although plans and profiles had doubtless been prepared for all of these sewers, - when the Town authorities turned over to us all the plans they had, there were none furnished us for sewers in the following streets, - Wanda, Reo, Ridge Park, Hedwig, Woodell, Alexander, Gualbert, Haller, Hoerner, Pine Ridge Road south of Wildy, Ivanhoe, Marne, Rowan, private right of way between Ivanhoe and Eggert, Roycroft Boulevard, Hurley, Concord, Chapel, Genesee St. from Harlem to Mildred, Grand Boulevard, and the portions of the following seven streets lying north of George Urban Boulevard, - West Grand Boulevard, Rosewood Terrace, Midland Drive, Westland Drive, Eastland Drive, Kilbourne Drive and East Grand Boulevard. This list comprises about 30% of the total length of all the lateral sewers.

We might state in passing that although the approval of the State Authorities may have been obtained for these plans and profiles, that of those we did receive, - none bore the stamp of approval of the authorities who are designated by law to pass on such plans.

We find also a similar carelessness in the matter of preserving the town records, as to the contracts for these lateral sewers. The Town Authorities have no written contracts for these lateral sewers for none are included in the papers turned over to us. The Town Clerk has examined the records of the Town Board meetings during the period of the construction of these sewers and has turned over to us copies of all the records of the proceedings of the Board relating to contracts awarded to various contractors for these sewers, but these records gave us no information as to whom contracts were awarded for sewers in the following streets, -

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Roycroft Boulevard, Peach Tree Road, Normandy, Rowland, Winkler, Loxley (south part) Genesee (south side, Loxley to Pine Ridge), Kaufmann (west side, Geo. Urban Boul. to Peach Tree Road), Harlem Road (West side, Straley to Walden), 1st. Street, 2nd Street, 3rd Street and 4th Street, Krakus, Walden Ave. (North side, east and west of Krakus) Marne Road (both sides, Delavanto Rowan), Rowan Road both sides, Ivanhoe to Marne), Ivanhoe (east side, Delavan to Rowan) Private right of way connecting Ivanhoe, Marne and Eggert Road sewers, Private right of way, middle of block between Eggert Road and Ivanhoe, from 150 ft. north of Delavan to Rowan.

In the case of Roycroft Boulevard, while we do not find any contract for constructing sewers, we do find in the records, Estimate No. 1, for constructing sewers there by Kenda Construction Co., Contractors. This estimate, dated Feb. 1, 1928, is prepared by the Engineers, George C. Diehl, C.E., Inc. and shows the Kenda Co. completed the full length of 2973 feet of 10" sewer, the 10 manholes, the 58 "Y" connections, the 26 cu. yds. of concrete for tamping (for which the price is one cent per cubic yard), the 26 feet of risers, and 50 lineal feet of tunnels (although the inspector's book shows only 22 lineal feet), - in all amounting to \$8,530.26. Ten per cent of this is deducted, leaving for Estimate No. 1 on this job, - \$7,677.23. We find in the minutes of the Town Board that on Feb. 6, 1928, they authorized payment to the Kenda Co. of this \$7,677.23, and on Feb. 8, 1928 a check, #6058, on the Liberty Bank for this amount was drawn payable to the Kenda Construction Co. Similarly on April 2, 1928, the Town Board authorized a payment to the Diehl organization for \$426.51, being the 5% fee of the \$8,530.26 for Roycroft Boulevard sewer construction cost. The items in this estimate cover the entire work built into these sewers, yet we do not find in this case, what we have found in other cases, - a final estimate for the 10% held back.

A peculiar piece of construction was allowed to pass and be paid for on Pine Ridge Road at its intersection with Wildy Street. John Raccouia was given a contract to build a lateral sewer in Pine Ridge Road from Wildy Street for 270 feet south. There evidently was an old 8" sewer in Pine Ridge Road leading south from the manhole at Wildy. The new 10" sewer starts out from this same manhole and runs southwesterly for about four feet and then takes a bend of about 45° to the left and extends southerly along Pine Ridge Road to the manhole at its southerly end. The criticism of this construction is that all sewers between manholes should be straight, - for the purpose of inspection and in order that they may be cleaned with the regular cleaning rods. If an angle had to be made in the sewer, a manhole should have been built at that point.

We have prepared charts covering 6 sheets of our findings in regard to the 25 miles of lateral sewers. The charts show the location of the manholes, the locations of holes or depressions where surface water apparently finds its way into the ground and into the sewers. It is at the location of these holes and depressions that work should be directed towards digging up and repairing the leaks in the sewers.

Where we have been furnished plans and profiles of these sewers, our measurements show that they have been built practically as planned, and the quantities are substantially correct.

The condition of sewers in Delavan Avenue, Ivanhoe and Marne streets, where for some years, sewage has backed up, is very bad. The old custom, handed down from past years, of allowing these sewers to fill up to the level of an overflow into a storm sewer emptying into the Buffalo sewer system, causes the depositing and decomposing of solid matter in these sewers and manholes and to some extent in the connections leading to the houses, - which if continued, will eventually clog the sewers. It also causes unpleasant odors to arise from the manholes. The booster station pumps should be operated automatically and keep these sewers free from the accumulation of sewage.

On account of the small amount of sewage flowing in most of the sewers at this season of the year, sediment has collected in them and it should be cleaned out with sewer rods. Even in the larger sewers of the original Kenda contract, which were examined earlier in the year, the heavy flow due to leakage did not scour the pipes clean of this sediment.

We wish to call your attention more particularly now to the financial statement in regard to the original Kenda Col contract, which on account of information discovered during the measuring up of the laterals, has been revised as of today, and is attached to this report. Referring to this statement and comparing it with the final estimate for the Kenda Construction Co., dated Nov. 1, 1928, we wish to call your attention to the following facts.

The greatest difference in lengths of all sizes of sewer between what Kenda Co. was paid for and what we found (with the exception of 10" sewers) was in the 15" sewer, where we found 44 feet less than was paid for. The other differences were as follows: 12" sewer, 10 feet less; 18" sewer, 36 feet less; 20" sewer, 5 feet less; 24" sewer, 34 feet less; 36" sewer, 17 feet less; 42" sewer, 3 feet less, and in 48" sewer we found 4 feet more than was paid for, - making a net difference of 145 feet in all but the 10" sewer. In the case of the 10" sewer, Kenda Co. was paid for 20,807 feet, while we find and measure up 17,238 feet in the ground, - a difference of 3,569 feet. Where this large difference of 3,569 feet of 10" sewer occurs, we have been unable to discover. According to the records, Kenda Construction Co. had no contracts for lateral sewers although they were paid separately, \$7,677.23 for building 2973 feet of 10" sewers in Roycroft Boulevard.

We have also measured up various other 10" sewers in which the Town employed various contractors (other than Kenda Co.) to build. We have also measured up two 10" sewers for which we find no contracts let. The first of these two is on the west side of Harlem Ave. from near Walden Ave. to Straley Ave. and consists of 1268 feet of 10" sewer. The other of these two, is a sewer leading southerly from Aurora St. on the extension of Marsdale Ave. to a proposed street leading west from Harlem Road at Corey Court. This latter sewer has 631 feet of 10" pipe. We have been unable so far to allocate the contractors of these sewers, but in the case of the Harlem Ave. sewer, - Mr. Elmer Messner, Town Engineer of your Town, in an interview stated that to the best of his recollection, the former was not built by Kenda Co. but that the latter of these two sewers (viz: 631 feet of 10") was built by the Kenda Co. and that it was added into their estimates and paid for by the Town. If Mr. Messner's recollection is correct, this would reduce this difference from 3569 feet to 2938 feet of 10" sewer.

We have spent a great deal of time and effort to account for these differences. In going over the inspectors' books, the measurements between manholes differ somewhat from the engineer's notes, as to lengths of sewers as they were staked out for building, - so that in the case of all the sewers except the 10", we feel that the differences, running from 3 to 4 feet up to 44 feet, are no more than we would expect under the circumstances, on so large a job.

In our report of June 20th., 1933, we stated, - "In the easterly (sprinkling) filter bed there must be bad leaks in the piping leading to the riser pipes with the spray nozzles on top." Mr. Eberl has had the crushed stone removed from above some of the piping on the floor of the bed and has found that two tees have been split open by the frost. He has removed these as well as four riser pipes that were also split by the frost. One very large leak in a 4" horizontal lateral pipe has just been uncovered. This leak is about 8 inches long and the widest part of the gap is over one inch. The discovery of this large leak has verified our prediction of June 30th. It is vitally important that there shall be no leaks in the piping in the sprinkling filter beds, as the siphons in the dosing tanks are what is called the "trapless" type. This type of siphon relies upon the piping in the filter beds being water tight as that piping constitutes the short leg of the siphon. When the leaks in this piping are all found and repaired, the siphon will function and the dosing tank will fill to the proper level, - which it never had done since I first saw it. The filling of the dosing tank to its proper level is essential to the proper spraying of sewage in the air, - thereby giving the proper oxidizing effect to the organic matter in the sewage.

We are also enclosing with this report, our map #14,185, "C", "C", - which is a complete map showing all the sewers built by the Kenda Co. and all lateral sewers. All the manholes are numbered, the sizes of all the sewers are given and where the light was visible in the sewer between manholes, an "L" is shown on the map. We are sending three

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copies of this map one to be filed with this report, - the others being for the use of the Town Highway Superintendent and the Town Engineer.
